Interplast UK takes medical teams on two-week long missions, two or three times a year, to provide free plastic surgery to patients in developing countries who otherwise would not have the opportunity to receive it.

- Each Interplast UK team is made up of appropriately skilled and experienced medical and paramedical staff and support staff. All team members are volunteers who give up their free time or holiday allowance to join a team.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Interplast UK have completed three medical missions this year:

- May 2015 – mission based at Kirf Community Hospital, Kashmir, Pakistan. 7 team members took part and 74 surgical procedures were carried out.
- October 2015 – mission based at Kumi Hospital, Uganda. 15 team members took part and 75 surgical procedures were carried out. Patients ranged from 3 weeks old to 80 years and many conditions were treated, including cleft lip/palate, keloid scars and severe burn contractures.
- March 2016 – mission based at W Pratiksha Hospital in Gurgaon, India. 13 team members took part and 80 surgical procedures were carried out, with many patients receiving surgery for burns and acid attacks to the face.
